Reflections

As I reflect over the year 2020, I am in awe of how resilient we have become in shifting our places of worship from 11 o'clock Sunday morning church sanctuary to alternative places, how topics which were once considered taboo have become everyday conversations with our family and friends, how approaches to evangelism are stirring up our gifts of creativity and how we have shifted into a more intimate relationship with God. I am excited about 2021 and looking forward to the spiritual formation that will take place. It is amazing how we are being informed that God is the same yesterday, today and will be forever.

In March 2020, when an executive order went out to disband social gatherings such as church services, a shift began to happen, and some of our churches sought other ways of gathering for worship services. I am reminded of the tabernacle in the wilderness which was a portable place of worship that God

instructed the Israelites to build after they crossed the Red Sea until King Solomon built the first temple in Jerusalem. If the children of Israel endured a portable tabernacle for some 400 years, we can wait until the leadership of our local churches determine it is now time to return safely into the church building. We have studied, theoretically, that the church is on the inside of us, and now we are practicing it giving witness that worship is still happening. The church has not fallen by the wayside.

Some churches have embraced Facebook, telephone conference calls, zoom video conferencing, church parking lots, and other places for worship. Regardless of the place, our worship is the same; we hear the reading of the scriptures, prayers, singing, and people are given the opportunity for discipleship and given instruction accordingly. We observe Holy Communion, engage in fellowship, reading of the sick list and giving God praise with our lips, honking of car horns, flashing of car lights and yes, some have been known to step out the car, dance next to the car, or run around it, all while keeping a safe distance. The place has changed, but the worship is still enforced and intense.

Like the metaphor of the ball and the egg: they both were thrown to the floor; the ball bounced back up, but the egg broke and could not be put back together again. Northwest B is like the ball, we bounce back recognizing this COVID-19 pandemic situation as a Tabernacle of Wilderness experience.

Not only are we experiencing worship in different places, but our conversations have shifted. We are being introduced to new words, alternative methods, and concepts, such as how we celebrate the life of our loved ones who have passed from labor to reward. To engage in conversation and assure we are on one accord when talking with others, it has become necessary to educate ourselves on a few terms such as:

<u>Covid-19</u>: Coronavirus Disease 2019; the first case was noticed in December 2019, in Wuhan in China.

<u>Essential services</u>: services we need to survive. These include hospitals, supermarkets, buses, electricity, and water services, and, of course, TV, radio, and online news!

<u>Frontline staff</u>: doctors, nurses, and other healthcare workers who treat patients with the coronavirus or encounter the virus at work.

PPE: personal protective equipment, such as gowns, masks, face shields, and gloves for healthcare workers, which helps stop them from catching the virus from patients.

Self-isolating: staying away from other people because you either have or might have the virus.

Self-isolation usually lasts 14 days from the first time you feel unwell.

<u>Underlying conditions:</u> certain medical problems which can mean that the virus would have a much worse effect on someone. Vaccine: This is a treatment that makes you better able to fight an infection by introducing a tiny bit of the germs into your body. It is not enough to give you the disease, but enough that your immune system knows how to fight it in the future. Ventilator: A machine that helps

you breathe.

Vulnerable groups: People who are more likely to get the virus, such as the elderly or people who already have certain medical problems.

Those of you who are parents of school-age children, students, or educators know, all too well, the concept of the virtual classroom. It brings its advantages as well as disadvantages. Students are encouraged to be disciplined, do your best, be respectful, and remember why you are in school; that being to learn. We have learned to adjust and move forward the best we know how carrying with us the Christian principles we were taught.

Funerals are one of the four ordinances we observe in the United American Free Will Baptist Denomination. Others are the Holy Communion Service, Baptism, and Weddings. All four ordinances require an ordained, licensed person to perform committal, pronouncement, and/or ceremonies. Styles of funerals and the number of people attending has somewhat

changed. Whether it is graveside only, live streaming, or in a building, a scripture or scriptures are read, prayer is given, in some instances, music is a part of the program; however, the people's mannerism is solemn and respectful. We practice the 3 W's while in attendance - Wear Mask, Wash Hands and Wait 6 feet. Death is sacred, and our celebrations of life are indeed celebratory.

God has blessed those working in the Evangelism field to be creative and intentional in their efforts. My pastor, Elder James Collins of Goldsboro Chapel, shared with the congregation that he has observed that some people are perhaps afraid of dying because they are not ready. Considering the number of reported deaths due of COVID-19 and the possibility of more deaths makes it a cruial mandate for evangelists and missionaries to be in the field. While we have the opportunity, let us cry aloud the interpretation of Romans 10:9 That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. Using your platform, EVANGELIZE to the glory of God.

Although we are wearing a mask, we can still birth a smile on the lips of people by sharing our smile with them. Practice by standing in the mirror with your mask on and smile; notice the radiance shining through the cloth. Make a


gloomy face, a sad face, an angry face, and notice the difference.

The Holy Spirit grants us access to an anointing that can be seen and felt by others. As we pass through this dark place called earth interacting with God's creations such as humanity, let us be mindful of our presence and ask God to show us how to take who we are, who we want to be, and what we can do and use it for a purpose that is greater than who we are. In the role of Lay Voices Coordinator, Eldress Myers will be responsible for planning and implementing educational and recognition programs that will fulfill the purpose of this ministry.

Mindfulness "Three Good Things"

WHY YOU SHOULD TRY IT

In our day-to-day lives, it's easy to get caught up in the things that go wrong and feel like we're living under our own private rain cloud; at the same time, we tend to adapt to the good things and people in our lives, taking them for granted. As a result, we often overlook everyday beauty and goodness — a kind gesture from a stranger, or the warmth of our heater on a chilly morning.

In the process, we frequently miss opportunities for happiness and connection. This practice guards against those tendencies. By remembering and listing three positive things

that happened in your day and considering what caused them, you tune into the sources of goodness in your life. It's a habit that can change the emotional tone of your life, replacing feelings of disappointment or entitlement with those of gratitude, which may be why this practice is associated with significant increases in happiness.

10 minutes/day for at least one week.

HOW TO DO IT - Each day for at least one week, write down three things that went well for you today, and provide an explanation for why they went well. It is important to create a physical record of your items by writing them down; it is not enough simply to do this exercise in your head. The items can be relatively small in importance (e.g., "my neighbor cut my grass today ") or relatively large (e.g., "I paid my mortgage today"). To make this exercise part of your daily routine, some find that writing before bed is helpful.

As you write, follow these instructions:

1. Give the event a title (e.g., "my neighbor cut my grass today").
2. Write down exactly what happened in as much detail as possible, including what you did or said and, if others were involved, what they did or said.
3. Include how this event made you feel at the time and how this event made you feel later

(including now, as you remember it).

4. Explain what you think caused this event—why it came to pass. 5. Use whatever writing style you please, and do not worry about perfect grammar and spelling. Use as much detail as you'd like. 6. If you find yourself focusing on negative feelings, refocus your mind on the good event and the positive feelings that came with it.

This can take effort but gets easier with practice and can make a real difference in how you feel.

WHY IT WORKS - By giving you the space to focus on the positive, this practice teaches you to notice, remember, and savor the better things in life. It may prompt you to pay closer attention to positive events down the road and engage in them more fully—both in the moment and later on, when you can reminisce and share these experiences with others. Reflecting on the cause of the event may help attune you to the deeper sources of goodness in your life, fostering a mindset of gratitude.

Concerns at the Local Church Level: Reaching the Next Generation

When presented with a list of possible challenges facing their church, half of Protestant pastors note that "reaching a younger audience" (51%) is a major issue for their ministry. Just over onethird of pastors (34%) marked this statement as a top three concern for their church, with 12 percent noting it as the top concern.

Half of pastors also agree that "declining or inconsistent outreach and evangelism" is a major issue facing their local church. Of all the pastors who affirm this statement, exactly two in five or 40% say it falls within their top three concerns, with 14% agreeing it is their largest concern.

The findings above fall in step with past studies which offer a glimpse into the ups and downs of ministry work. One such example shows that "low spiritual maturity among churchgoers" has been an increasing pain point for pastors over the years.

Meanwhile, the practice of evangelism has fallen out of favor

even with young adults who are practicing Christians.

Overall, more than one in three pastors note that "declining or inconsistent volunteering" is an issue facing their ministry today, with about one-quarter saying it is one of the top three problems. Similar proportions express worry in regard to "stagnating spiritual growth".

One in four United States pastors select "lack of leadership training and development" as a major concern facing their church today. In terms of developing young leaders, data featured in both The State of Pastors and Leadership Transitions reports show that as of 2017, only 15% of senior pastors were 40 years old or younger, echoing the need for younger pastors in ministry. The State of Pastors research also showed that 7 in 10 United States pastors agree "it is becoming harder to find mature young Christians who want to become pastors."

For their recent poll, Barna also asked pastors to rate issues facing the Christian Church at large in the U. S. While a variety of issues were mentioned, a few concerns related to strong discipleship and teaching during an era of seculariztion bubble to the top. U. S. pastors rank "watered down Gospel teachings" as the largest issue.
